Retired but working

"Coldwell ... this is Pat," answers a cheery voice.

Pat Kennedy retired last Friday, just five days shy of her 85th birthday.

This Shoreview resident with white hair, an easy smile and outgoing personality, says she's not the type to stay at home. She tried retirement once, for three years, but didn't like it.

"I'm a natural born let's-do-it-even-if-it's-wrong type of person," Kennedy said.

For the past 12 years she has worked as a receptionist at the Shoreview/North Oaks Coldwell Banker Burnet office.

Still full of life and energy, she's retiring now only because she has something else to do—her son, Bruce Kennedy of Roseville, is running for Minnesota Secretary of State, and Kennedy plans to work with his campaign committee.

Kennedy thrives on staying busy. The Chicago native (who still loves the Cubs and Bears) started her own lemonade stand at age 12 and quickly discovered that she loved being with people. "It sounds so trite to say I'm a people person, but (I am)." she

She gained the trust of her clients too. Kennedy recalled one couple who simply signed their purchase agreement and left to watch a Chicago Bears game, trusting her to fill in the rest of the paperwork.

Kennedy's husband died in 1980, and she retired two years later. It didn't take long, however, for her to realize she needed to do something, so she moved to Minnesota to help care for her autistic grandson. She bought condo a Shoreview because the area reminded her of Homewood.

Kennedy volunteered for a while at Fairview and St. Johns' hospitals, delivering flowers to new mothers and running errands.

But she missed working. and she missed the real estate business. She wanted a real job again and soon found herself as a receptionist in a real estate office.

At Coldwell she worked 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. Tuesday through Friday and rarely, if ever, called in sick.

"Every morning you came here she was here." sales manager Jack McCarty


